*The science and art of career planning, job skills, resource management, time management, nutrition, food preparation, menu planning, parenting, substance abuse, child care and development, healthy living, clothing and textiles, consumer education, decision making, problem solving, human relationships, family development, and anything else that touches the home and heart.*

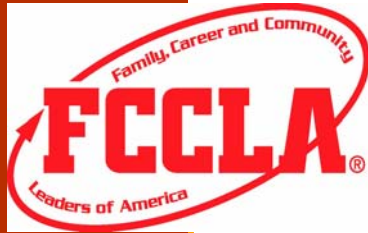


Young Living is a state Family Consumer Science program that will incorporate the Meridian School District 8th grade FCS curriculum. Included in this semester of Young Living you will complete a self-discovery unit, a foods unit, a cultural foods unit, a sewing concept unit, a sewing project unit, an interior design unit, and a finance unit. Each learning unit includes fun projects, labs, and cooperative group learning as well as individual reflections that will help you learn to be a successful teenager in today's world.

## Grades in FCS

Grades are based on many different activities in FCS. Activities, assignments, and projects can be accomplished by students during class time. Students will only have homework if they are wasting time during class and need time at home to accomplish a task. Cooking labs and projects make up most of the points in FCS. If a student is absent during a cooking lab they are expected to cook at home and complete a lab make-up form, which will be provided by Miss Tracy. Extra credit can be earned ONLY by students who have no missing work. An anytime extra credit project is to bring a note signed from home stating that the student cooked, what he/she cooked, AND that he/she CLEANED-UP after himself/herself.

# FCCLA



In addition to the Meridian School District curriculum for FCS we will also be working on some Family, Career, and Community Leaders of America Projects. Heritage Middle Schools FCCLA club is intercurricular, meaning we have club meetings in class instead of before or after school. 6th grade students will be taking on leadership roles, using parliamentary procedures, and completing projects using the FCCLA planning process. We will elect six class officers during the second week of school which will include a class president, vice-president, treasurer, secretary, classroom assistant, and photographer.

## Rules and Expectations

I have one main expectation of my students and classes: manage yourself. My motto is “Manage yourselves or I will manage you.” This means that as an individual you need to be thinking about your actions before you act. It also means that if you need to assist someone in managing themselves you do so respectfully by reminding them to be quiet, showing them where work goes, etc.

Things I expect students to manage are:

- Be in class on time (you will be tardy if you’re not in your seat working when the bell rings)
- Be awake and alert during class
- Turn in assignments complete and on time in the appropriate basket. Late work will be given a grade of 0.
- Take responsibility for necessary make-up work
- Bring all necessary materials to class each day
- Have an open mind and willingness to learn
- Keep the classroom and lab area clean
- Follow lab rules and procedures during cooking labs and sewing labs (These will be reviewed and tested at a later date)



# Personal Development



During the Personal Development unit you will spend time exploring who you truly are. We will talk about self-concept, personality development, and family types. We will spend time throughout this unit completing a personal development art project and you will also complete the first part of The Power of One FCCLA project, A Better You.

# Foods & Nutrition



The foods and nutrition unit will be broken into two parts (one during the beginning of the semester and one at the end). We will spend time working on a variety of foods labs and will complete the semester with a cultural restaurant foods project in which you and your team will research a culture and develop a working restaurant around that culture for guests to enjoy.

# Sewing Concepts and Project

During the sewing units you will learn the basics of sewing on a machine as well as the techniques used in clothing design and clothing construction. You will learn to create patterns as well as use patterns. You will also use a pattern to make a pair of pajama pants. Most sewing supplies will be provided, but you will be required to provide fabric for your pajama pants. We will discuss the type and amount of fabric you should purchase in later in the semester. Students will also be required to do one hand sewn project for which supplies will be provided.

# Interior Design



During the interior design unit you will learn about the basics of design including color and line. You will also learn about traffic flow in a room and you will draft and create design plans for a room in your home.

# Miss Tracy's Discipline Plan

**Step 1:** Student is warned about inappropriate behavior. Student must pay 1 Tracy Dollar.

**Step 2:** Student is put on step 1 of the referral system and pays 1 Tracy Dollar.

**Step 3:** Student is put on step 2 of the referral system and given a discipline essay they must copy and have signed by a parent. Counselor is notified.

**Step 4:** Student leaves the room with discipline essay. Student is put on step 3 of the referral system. Discipline essay is to be signed and returned the next day. Vice Principal notified.

**Step 5:** Student is sent directly to the Vice Principal with a short form.

**Step 6:** Parent-teacher conference is scheduled to discuss student's behavior in Miss Tracy's room.

**Note:** At any time a step may be skipped due to the severity of a student's actions.

I expect students to follow the rules most other teachers have. I expect students to be respectful of each other and me. I also expect students to manage themselves (be on time, stay awake, turn in assignments, clean up after self, etc.) My classroom procedures are set up to require and encourage students to take responsibility of their own actions and work.

## Supply Wish List
